CANOE CRUISES. The Chehaw Council has ten canoes to lend out to Troops and Explorer Posts. We have a canoe trailer that will carry six and two sets of boat racks that allow carrying two canoes on top of each of two cars. The canoes must be hauled on the trailer or boat racks. There is a charge of \$1.00 per day per canoe (based on days used) to cover insurance, maintenance and replacement when the canoes and equipment wear out. The council furnishes paddles but the user must provide his own Coast Guard approved life jacket or boat cushion. There is a severe penalty for failure to do this and rangers strictly enforce this law. Make reservations in advance at the council office.
