CHEHAW COUNCIL CHANGES NAME

A NEW NAME

The first day of July 1984 was a historic day in our Council. On that day our official Council corporate and communicative named was changed. By act of the Council Executive Board at its June 26, 1984 meeting our Council offically adopted the name SOUTHWEST GEORGIA COUNCIL INC. BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA.

The resoultion which was after much thought and consideration unanimously approved, stated the following reasons for creating a new Council identification.

- To adopt a corporate and communicative name that speaks for the entire seventeen county area.
- To improve the Councils ability to tell the public who we are and what we do.
- To provide a corporate and communicative identification that easily states where we are located.
- To avoid being confused with other public supported organizations that bear similar names.
- To better serve our youth through an improved public relations and communications program that effectively tells the Scouting story.
- To provide a singulary exclusive name that establishes our Council as the delivery unit of the Scouting program in Southwest Georgia.

Based on the great traditions of the past. Our Council now has a golden opportunity to begin a new era of execellence in pride, tradition and service. Here are some comments that have been shared concerning our new name:





School Night has made it known that we have a need to develope a better commissioner staff for communicating the needs of the units and the help leaders are looking for.


